I know I will make errors in this role and you will have seen a few already in the arranging of competitions and the results, but using the software is new to me. Thank you for being patient and pointing those errors out!

We are a new committee, although from the first meeting we had last week online it was clear that we all want to move forward and it was great to see those from the North join in. We will be holding meetings monthly for the rest of the season so that we can look at ways to improve.

Those at Bramley will have seen the new AGA shirts and two were given as prizes for the winners.

For those that attended Lindrick I hope you all enjoyed a fantastic course and those that didn't, you missed a great venue. Thanks to the Lindrick Artisans for opening the clubhouse and the welcome you all provided. It just showed the spirit of the Artisan movement.

Temple is a few days away and so far, we have 16 pairs competing for the Douglas Johns Trophy.

Little Aston is 02 July which I suspect will be our last visit there for a few years as we are keen to move the events so that we all get to play other great courses around the country.

We have taken on board some comments about playing 36 holes in one day which is too much for some and we are potentially looking at a pm round followed by a morning round so there will be no need for two nights away; only one night away will be required unless you are lucky enough to be local to the venue.

More of this later in the year as we plan to announce venues and dates before November so that you can all plan the year ahead.

I will say that entry numbers are well down on last year which may be due to venues/timing/clashes, however, we do need to try to get full entry lists again. I know cost is a big thing to us all these days, but the courses we play are top of the range and that comes at a price as we do tend to take the course over for the entire day.

At this point I need to thank Pat for all the money he obtains from England Golf which we use to help fund the competitions so that it reduces the cost to you, our members. Thanks Pat and please show me how to do this for next year!

Rest assured we are doing our best and if you want to discuss anything please get in touch.

I was asked to say something about my golf. I started playing at aged 11 when we moved to Ilkley (West Yorkshire) and backed on to the 9th tee of Ben Rhydding GC. I played regularly get to a steady 15 handicap but golf competed with cricket.

Then at 18 I joined Keighley GC and got to 10 handicap before heading to London to work and golf stopped.

8 years and a few jobs later, I was in Manchester and joined Withington GC getting down to 9 handicap. Then back to London and West Middlesex GC where I played every weekend and 7 handicap was reached.

My best ever opening was achieved with -6 after 6 needless to say 2 over after 18.

A move to Surrey and I joined Rusper GC just north of Horsham. I got down to 6 handicap on a brutal course but loved the challenge. I was Captain for the last 2 years of the club's history. This is when I found Artisan golf at Betchworth and boy what a find! There I managed to get to 0.4 (for a week!) now 3.4 but working hard to get lower again.

So on to some stats:

My best round has been a -4 at Betchworth, 4 holes in one, best course played Sawgrass or Turnberry but I have been spoilt as to where I have played.

Best achievements being asked to be your Secretary and winning the Sandy Herd (2024-25) / SAGU Scratch (2022-24).

One final thing to say is that all those that sit as your Committee do so for the love of the game and are not paid do so. I realize the time that is given up by all and the amount of work behind the scenes is huge - Thank you to my fellow Committee for the time you give and to those that have gone before us.

If you have read this far you have done well. Next report will be much shorter!

Northern Captain's Report



With much appreciated assistance from The Berkshire Golf Club, a full calendar of club competitions and matches has been arranged for this season. So far there have been three competitions, the last of these being accompanied by the renowned 'after-competition' burgers provided by Steve Halford that were much appreciated. To raise money for his chosen charities - Guide Dogs for the Blind, Dementia UK and Air Ambulance, our new Captain Trevor has selected a number of penalty bunkers on both courses. Any player visiting one or more of these bunkers during a singles competition will contribute 50p for each to Trevor's charities - so far, the charity pot is growing well!!

Since the beginning of April, a number of very enjoyable matches have been played against The Berkshire Ladies and The Berkshire Gents, and also away matches against teams from St. George's Hill, Royal St. George's, Royal Cinque Ports and New Zealand as changes to the Blue Course especially is bedding-in. Home matches will begin to be played from 31 May against Royal Birkdale as

the course changes have now been largely completed. Both courses will continue to provide a good test for golfers of all levels as demonstrated over the last two weeks at Berkshire Trophy where the winner was only 7 under par for the four rounds played, and the winner of the Astor Salver was only 4 under par for the 36 holes played.

As mentioned in our report for the Winter 2024 Magazine, a number of major course changes are being made at The Berkshire – mostly to the Blue Course at present. The 10th hole on the Blue Course has now been significantly altered and new teeing areas and bunkering have also been completed on the Blue Course. The covered Driving Range and associated astroturf teeing areas are now available as well as a new grass area, and the new short-game area is due to open by the middle of June. A new reservoir has also been established on the left-hand side of the 15th Hole on the Red Course and is due to be completed by the end of June.

A number of significant improvements have also been made to our clubhouse including new internal flooring and furnishings, and external decking and seating. Grateful thanks from the whole club go to Trevor Bowron, Mark Hellier, Bill Cox and Steve Cox, Ali Burns, Mark Page, Dave Fuller and Neil Spurling for their time and effort in making these improvements in readiness for our home matches that are fast approaching.

Best wishes to all from Forest for an excellent 2025 golfing season, we hope to see many of you as the year progresses.

Brett came to the club directly after completing a rebuild of all the bunkers at Pasatiempo Golf Club in California, one of Alister MacKenzie's most beloved course designs and his home from 1929 until his death in 1934.

Harewood Downs



Obituaries

Robert (Bob) Cox



Robert Cox passed away on the 20th February 2025 aged 86. A true gentleman, his passion for golf, impeccable style, sharp mind & sense of humour set him apart as someone special.

His enthusiasm knew no bounds and his love of golf rubbed off on his playing partners & opponents alike, making him ever popular to play with. Bob was always first with a "good shot" even when his own game had deteriorated in his later years.

Bob joined the Aldridge Artisans in 1968, initially at Sutton Coldfield he moved to Little Aston in 1978. Bob was a single figure golfer winning everything there was to win within our club including the club championship. He started off young, winning the Staffordshire Boys Open when he was 14 playing against boys as old as 18 and continued playing regularly until his early 80s.

Bob enjoyed attending the Northern and any golf trip with his extended family of golfing friends. One of his fondest memories was enjoying a trip to St Andrews in 2010. The last day of the trip being on the Old Course. Aided by a caddie Bob was one over par gross after 6 holes and went on to shoot 36 points and win that day. He was 72 at the time.

He was an Artisan for 57 years, a life member of Aldridge Artisans and was being considered for life memberships of the Artisan Golf Association before his demise. His family would like to thank the AGA for their donation to an annual trophy (The Bobby Cox Trophy) which they donated before his passing. His health deteriorated due to battles with cancer and his playing days appeared to be over but, with the aid of a buggy, he continued playing golf and was as enthusiastic as ever. He had an eagle in his 80's, won back-to-back Chairmans Challenge (a three-man Texas scramble) in his 80's and his last solo competition in 2022. After a round he loved nothing better than a quick drink with friends in the Pavillion (his affectionate name for our Starters Hut).



Bob's funeral was standing room only with an Artisan Guard of honour. A fitting tribute to a club stalwart and testament to his popularity.

Survived by his wife Jean, daughter Debbie, sons David & Stephen, three grandchildren & one great grandchild. Bob passed away peacefully at home.

He was a wonderful friend to a lot of people, a one off & the last of the old guard, he will be sorely missed.

Bill Bryce



For the Triangle Artisans 75th anniversary in 2000 the following tribute was made:

'Ever-present, ever-friendly, always busy, Syd has been Captain or Secretary or Junior Organiser for as long as anyone can remember. He has instructed, cajoled and encouraged youngsters to such effect that no fewer than eight Triangle Juniors have gone on to be professional's, including the present incumbent (at Piltdown) Jason Partridge.'

In a 2017 interview with Syd when asked about what Artisan golf meant to him he stated that:

"..if I wasn't an Artisan I wouldn't be playing golf.....when I joined, most of my friends were members of the Triangle Artisans and that was it really, a sense of community."

and when asked why Artisan golf exists, he was equally sure:

'Artisan golf is done for the benefit of the Parent club, whichever one it is.'

Syd continued playing golf until his own (Covid delayed) Centenary Pro-Am in 2022 and most recently could be seen on course in the summer months watching our Triangle weekly Wednesday competitions at Piltdown from the comfort of a golf buggy amongst friends.
